5. MEASURE X IMPLEMENTATION

The Committee received a presentation from Michael Zeller, Principal Transportation Planner, on the planned implementation activities for Measure X, the Transportation Safety & Investment Plan.

Mr. Zeller outlines the following activities that the Transportation Agency will be undertaking in coordination with the local jurisdictions in order to prepare for the disbursement of Measure X funding:

Funding Agreements (February - April 2017): The Transportation Agency will work with the local jurisdictions to establish the funding agreements necessary to distribute the local shares of Measure X revenues. This agreement will be similar to, and replace, the existing funding agreement the Agency already executes with the cities for the Regional Surface Transportation Program, and will be used to codify the provisions of the Transportation Safety and Investment Plan Policies and Procedures.

Early Launch Projects (April - June 2017): Agency staff would like to compile a list of shovel-ready projects that can be quickly constructed with Measure X funding once the revenues begin to be accrued. Projects will be used to demonstrate the early benefits of Measure X to the public.

Maintenance of Effort (June 2017): In order to receive Measure X funding, each city must report to the Transportation Agency on the amount of local funds spent on transportation for the prior three-years. The jurisdictions must continue to spend this rolling average amount on transportation in order to be eligible for Measure X distributions. This initial report on the jurisdiction's Maintenance of Effort will be due in June 2017.

Local Expenditure Plans (June 2017): By the end of June 2017, the Transportation Agency would like each jurisdiction to submit their five-year expenditure plans for the use of Measure X funds. This information will be incorporated into the full county-wide expenditure plan for Measure X, and will be used to track that funds are spent on eligible projects.

Pavement Management Program (February - July 2017): The Transportation Safety and Investment Plan implementing ordinance requires a region-wide pavement management plan be developed. Agency staff will be coordinating with jurisdictions to track the pavement condition of their local roads.

Subject: 2017 Competitive Grants Guidelines

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

REVIEW and **PROVIDE FEEDBACK** on the 2017 Regional Surface Transportation Program Competitive Grants program.

SUMMARY:

The Transportation Agency periodically programs Regional Surface Transportation Program, Transportation Development Act 2%, and Regional Development Impact Fee funds to local projects. Transportation Agency staff requests jurisdictions review and provide feedback on the draft guidelines.

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

The three-year estimated funding of Regional Surface Transportation Program for fiscal years 2017/18/19 is \$3.6 million for fair share and \$6.95 million for competitive grants.

DISCUSSION:

The Surface Transportation Program is a federal program that provides states and local jurisdictions with funding for highway improvements, street rehabilitation and transportation enhancements. The Transportation Agency receives an annual apportionment of Regional Surface Transportation Program funding, passed through the State. Because Monterey County didn't have an urbanized area with a population of greater than 200,000 in the 1990 census, it qualified for the state exchange Surface Transportation Program, whereby Caltrans keeps the federal Surface Transportation Program apportionments for a region and gives the regional agency an equivalent amount of state cash.

The Transportation Agency distributes Regional Surface Transportation Program funding in both fair-share and competitive programs. Monterey County and the cities receive fair-

share Regional Surface Transportation Program funds based on their population and road miles. The total fair share allocation over the next three years was set by the Transportation Agency Board of Directors at \$3.6 million. This fair share amount would be distributed to the jurisdictions as follows:

The Transportation Agency distributes part of the Regional Surface Transportation Program funding on a competitive basis to transportation projects based on a variety of criteria, including traffic volume and project deliverability. With the Transportation Agency now seeking to begin a new grant cycle, this process would involve the release of grant materials by the Transportation Agency, and the Technical Advisory Committee establishing a subcommittee to review and rank project proposals. The estimated three-year total available for grant funds is \$6.95 million (see **Attachment 1**).

Agency staff is proposing to award the competitive grants in two tiers, based on the availability of funding. The first tier would be funded with the estimated \$6.95 million in RSTP. The second tier would be funded with any deprogrammed funds from the last competitive grants cycle.

The Transportation Agency will also be updating its policies and procedures related to the Regional Surface Transportation Program. Transportation Agency staff will provide an update at the Technical Advisory Committee meeting on the guidelines, as well as review policies for the distribution of fair share allocations, the timely use of funds, use of interest, project eligibility, and discuss criteria and procedures for future grant cycles. The draft schedule for these activities are included as **Attachment 2**.

Subject: Call Box Program Evaluation

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

RECEIVE a presentation on the evaluation of the Monterey County Call Box Program; and **PROVIDE** input on the development of a Monterey County Call Box Modernization Plan.

SUMMARY:

The Agency currently maintains a network of 190 active call boxes across Monterey County. The Agency is in the process of evaluating the call box program to determine how to improve program efficiency, and is developing a County Call Box Modernization Plan.

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

The Service Authority for Freeways and Expressways program is funded by a locally-approved \$1 per vehicle surcharge as part of the annual Department of Motor Vehicle registration fees, which raises approximately \$350,000. The cost to operate this program in fiscal year 2015-2016 was \$132,566, which pays for the call center and CHP operations and annual maintenance of the boxes. In addition to paying for the callbox program, these revenues pay for other motorist aid services, such as the Agency's Rideshare Program, and the local match for the Freeway Service Patrol program. The goal of this evaluation is to focus the program where call boxes are most needed and eliminate locations that are underutilized. These changes may have a financial impact, including a reduction in cost.

DISCUSSION:

The Service Authority for Freeways Emergencies program provides free emergency telephone service at call boxes to stranded motorists. The Agency operates Monterey County's call box program in coordination with Caltrans and the California Highway Patrol. Call boxes enhance public safety and provide emergency roadside assistance to motorists,

particularly in area with poor or no cell phone service.

There are currently 190 active call boxes in Monterey County. Call boxes are located along the following routes: State Route 1, State Route 68, State Route 156, US Highway 101, Jolon Road, Carmel Valley Road, and Arroyo Seco Road. There are several issues facing the call box program in Monterrey County, including:

- A reduction in call box usage in some areas of Monterey County, due to the proliferation of cell phones.
- A need to upgrade call box sites to conform to current American with Disabilities Act (ADA) standards.
- The phasing out of 2G technology and the need to upgrade call boxes to 3G and 4G technology.

To address these issues and ensure an efficient use of resources, the Agency has evaluated call box usage from the previous three years to determine if there are opportunities to reduce the number of call boxes in Monterey County, thereby reducing program costs, as well as reduce the number of locations for ADA and 3G upgrades.

As part of the call box program evaluation and improvement plan, the Agency has:

- Reviewed call box usage in Monterey County for the past three years.
- Reviewed cell phone service coverage in Monterey County.
- Identified roads where adding call boxes might be appropriate.
- Compared the usage trend in Monterey County to other SAFE programs in California.
- Reviewed best practices from other SAFE programs in California.
- Developed criteria for maintaining or removing call box locations.

The Agency provided an up to to the Board of Directors at its December 7, 2016 meeting. At that time, the Board recommend that staff begin the process of working with local jurisdictions to determine locations for possible system reductions, as well as areas where additional call boxes may be needed.

Moving forward during this fiscal year, the Agency plans to:

- Coordinate with local jurisdictions about possible locations for call box removal or addition.
- Coordinate with Caltrans and the CHP about locations for call box removal or addition.
- Draft a recommended plan for call box program improvements.
- Seek Board, local agency, and public comment on the improvement plan for the call box program.
- Finalize the Call Box Program Modernization Plan for Board approval and implementation.

At this time, Agency staff welcomes comments and suggestions on the call box program evaluation and the development of the modernization plan.

Subject: Active Transportation Plan Update

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

RECEIVE update on the Monterey County Active Transportation Plan outreach campaign.

SUMMARY:

The 2017 Monterey County Active Transportation Plan is an update of the 2011 Bicycle and Pedestrian Master Plan. The focus of the 2017 Plan is to meet the State Active Transportation Program guidelines, incorporate innovative bicycle facility designs and promote high priority projects. Staff will present an update on the public outreach campaign.

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

The Plan is being developed in-house, and will position high priority projects to be more competitive for grant funding, such as the State's Active Transportation Program that had \$240 million available on a competitive basis in the last funding cycle.

DISCUSSION:

In addition to creating an Active Transportation Plan that will meet the State's guidelines, and identifying high priority bicycle and pedestrian projects, this effort will also focus on analyzing key gaps in the existing and proposed bicycle and pedestrian networks, identifying opportunity sites for innovative bicycle facility design, and designating areas for enhanced regional and local connectivity.

In May 2016, committee members from the Bicycle and Pedestrian Committee and the Technical Advisory Committee participated in a mapping activity to identify bicycle and pedestrian improvements throughout Monterey County. In August 2016, Committee

members provided input on the list of projects identified in the May mapping exercise. From September to December 2016, TAMC staff set up an online mapping public input tool. Members of the public were able to provide feedback on: barriers to bicycling/walking, routes that they currently walk/bike, and routes that they would like to bike/walk if improvements were made. Approximately 300 people submitted 430 comments via the Wikimapping tool. Staff collaborated with the Monterey County Health Department to gather input from their Greenfield Leadership and Civic Engagement group. Staff also collaborated with the City of Gonzales to host a South County public workshop for the Plan. The **attachment** summarizes the comments received throughout the public outreach period, and includes the comments submitted by the Committees and the public.

In the next few months, TAMC staff will be meeting with local city staff to review Plan comments, and refine the list of projects to be included in the Plan. Staff will rank projects, and will bring the ranked list to the Committees for input. Once high priority projects have been identified, TAMC will hire a consultant to develop preliminary designs and refined project costs. The goal is to have these high priority projects move farther along in their development so that they can be more competitive for State and Federal grant funds. This list will also assist cities and the County in identifying projects to be implemented with Measure X funds.

The Plan will be finalized over the summer, and adopted by the TAMC Board in fall 2017. By completing the Plan this year, bike and pedestrian projects will be ready for the next round of grant funds.

This document is a compilation of the comments received from the TAMC Bicycle and Pedestrian Facilities Advisory Committee, the Technical Advisory Committee and the public. Approximately 300 people submitted 430 comments via the public participation Wikimapping tool. Staff collaborated with the Monterey County Health Department to gather input from their Greenfield Leadership and Civic Engagement group. Staff also collaborated with the City of Gonzales to host a South County public workshop for the Plan.
